Reading- Inference

Read this text and answer the questions below.

The Great Fire of London started on 2nd September, 1666. Samuel Pepys wrote a diary about what he saw and did during this terrifying event. At first, when his servant woke him to say that there was a fire nearby, he had a look but did not think it was important.

After a while, it became clear that it was a big disaster and Pepys told the king he should order houses to be pulled down to stop it spreading.

By 4th September, even his own house was in danger so he dug a pit in his garden and buried his most important papers in it. Later that evening, he returned with a friend and dug another hole for his wine and parmesan cheese.

Question 1: Why did Samuel Pepys bury his cheese in his garden?

Question 2: What does the word 'disaster' mean?

Question 3: When did the Great Fire of London start?

Question 4: What items did Samuel Pepys bury in his garden?

Question 5: In the passage, what three characters are spoken about?

Writing - Writing commas in a list

When making a list, commas are the most common way to separate one list item from the next.

For example - For dinner I had chicken, potatoes, sweetcorn and cauliflower.

We must not forget that when we are writing lists we use 'and' before the last item instead of a comma.

For example - I was packing my suitcase for holiday and I packed a swimming costume, a sun hat and sun cream.



Starter: Can you work out how many triangles there are in the shape below?




Finding All Possibilities

Pick 3 cards which have a total of 12.
You can do it in 10 different ways.
See if you can find all 10.



William throws 3 bean bags and they all hit this target. He can hit a section more than once. What score could William have got? Find all possibilities.



Task 1:

Can you pick three cards between 0 and 9 which have a total of 12?

You can only use the number once within each calculation.

For example: $9 + 2 + 1 = 12$

Task 2

Can you write down some different scores you could get using 3 bean bags on the target?

You can hit one section more than once.

For example: $5 + 5 + 3 = 13$

Curriculum- Recycling

What is recycling? Recycling is when things that are no longer wanted are reused to make something new. For example when you are finished reading the newspaper, you can put it in the recycling bin. It is then collected in a bin lorry and taken to a factory to turn it back into new paper that can be used again.



There are lots of materials that can recycled such as:

- Most glass items
- Most metals items
- Most paper and cardboard items
- Many plastic items

Recycling is good for the environment as it means that we have less rubbish littering our world. It can help protect animals and their homes and means less rubbish ends up in places like the forests and seas. Sometimes you might see this  sign on your items at home which means it can be recycled.

Your job is to see if you can find any items with the above sign in your households. We would then like you to write a list of the things that you and your family have recycled today.
